FALL 2023: YOUR JOURNEY TO GW

Placing your deposit is the first step in your journey to GW. This fall as you prepare for your first day of class on Jan. 16, these are your must-do action items to complete by month to help you have a smooth transition to college. Visit your student portal to help you complete these tasks.

FALL

→ THROUGHOUT FALL

Work on the Pre-Orientation Online Module
This module must be completed by Jan. 6 as you will
need the information learned in this module during
a mandatory first-year group advising webinar. Note:
While this module will be available in the fall, you
are not able access the module until after you have
created your GW email.

Register with Disability Support Services (if applicable)

If you would like support to accommodate a disability for your classes or living on campus, you can register with **Disability Support Services (DSS)**. Should your situation change, you may register with DSS at any point while enrolled at GW.

→ STARTING MID-OCTOBER

Register for First-Year On-Campus Housing
All first- and second-year students are required
to live on campus with a few exceptions for local
commuters, etc. The registration process starts midOctober. Students will receive instructions directly
from Campus Living & Residential Education. The
registration and room assignment process takes
about a month. Students will receive their housing
assignment mid-December.

→ BY NOV. 6

Claim your GW Identity (i.e., UserID/GW email) You will need your UserID/GW email to search for a roommate, apply for housing, register for classes and much more. Your UserID starts with the letter G followed by an eight-digit number. After Nov. 6, we will no longer email your personal email address. Check your GW email often (we suggest daily). Your GW email is the primary means by which GW offices and units will communicate with you while you are enrolled at GW.

Note: You will need your UserID and GW email to complete the following action items.

☐ Register for New Student Orientation

You must register for new student orientation by Dec. 21 so we can reserve your space and assign you a small group. During registration you will also select a District Connections trip to attend during orientation week. Reminder: In-person orientation is Jan. 14 and make-up orientation is Jan. 20.

☐ Submit Mandatory Health Immunizations

The District of Columbia Immunization Law requires that all enrolled students under the age of 26 provide proof of certain immunizations prior to registration. Deadline to submit immunizations via the Student Health Center medical portal is Jan. 4.

☐ Review GW's Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP) Coverage

All undergraduate students, including international students, must have medical health insurance coverage while enrolled at GW. Students are automatically enrolled each academic year in the GW Student Health Insurance Plan provided by Aetna Student Health.

If you are still covered by a parent's or guardian's employer coverage and want to continue using their health insurance plan, you must waive out of the GW Student Health Insurance option each year you are enrolled.

Before you waive out of GW's Student Health Insurance plan, we recommend that you familiarize yourself with how your insurance coverage works outside of your geographic area (e.g., copays, deductibles, networks). This is especially important for international students as health care insurance from other countries may not be compatible with the U.S. healthcare system. The waiver (opt-out) period opens Dec. 1 and closes Feb. 1 2024

information menu. Here you can add or update
your chosen name (which will be your display name
across university systems, including class rosters),
pronouns and gender identity, and contact information.

→ DUE DECEMBER 15

☐ Upload Your Photo to Create Your GWorld Card (your student ID)

Your **GWorld Card** is your official GW identification card. It grants you access to campus including all academic buildings, the library and your residence hall. You will also use your card to enter the dining halls to eat, unlock your residence hall door, and print your term papers at printing kiosks.

→ ONGOING TASKS

☐ Take Placement Exams

Language, math, economics and chemistry classes may require placement exams to determine your class level. Note: You must complete all required placement exams a minimum of one week before class registration begins to help your academic adviser determine which course best fits your level and schedule.

Language: Each foreign language department has a specific exam and/or policy regarding placement. Those with high AP/IB scores and native speakers may have special instructions for which level they should take. For details, visit the **Language Center website**.

Math and Economics: The ALEKS (Assessment and Learning in Knowledge Spaces) Math Placement Test is required for any students who intend to register for ECON 1001, ECON 1011, MATH 1051, MATH 1220, MATH 1231 or MATH 1252.

Consult the Department of **Economics' ALEKS webpage** and the Department of **Mathematics' ALEKS webpage** for more information and to take the test.

Chemistry: General Chemistry (CHEM 1111) requires completion of the ALEKS Chemistry Preparatory Course (CPC). This applies to all incoming students who intend on pursuing coursework in the following fields: applied sciences, biological sciences, chemical sciences, engineering (all majors), physical science (B.S. only), pre-health sciences (e.g., dentistry, medicine, veterinary medicine and nursing). For more information and to take the test, visit the Department of **Chemistry's ALEKS website**.

☐ Review and <u>Submit Your FERPA Waiver</u> (*if applicable*)

GW abides by the federal government's FERPA policy (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974), which requires the university to protect the privacy of your student educational record. This means staff and faculty can only talk to you, and not your parent, guardian or other family member about your classes, grades, financial aid, etc. If at any time, you would like to give consent to allow a staff or faculty member to talk to a family member about your educational records, you will need to fill out a FERPA/Student Consent Release Form. Note: this form can be completed at any time while enrolled at GW.

☐ Review Your Student eBill (tuition invoice) and Grant an Authorized User Access to Your Student Account

To help with your financial planning, the Office of Student Accounts will email first-year students a preliminary eBill, i.e., invoice for tuition, room and board and fees (as applicable). A follow-up eBill will be issued after class registration. You (the student) can grant another authorized user access to your Student Account who can make online payments on your behalf such as a parent, guardian or another family member. Add a new authorized user by logging into the eBill **system** and clicking authorized users on the right menu bar. Next enter the other individual's email address and that new authorized user will be sent a unique encrypted password and link to your eBill. Note: registering another individual as an authorized user does not sign them up for any emails/lists from GW. They will only receive information from Student Accounts about the eBill.

Academic advising helps students explore academic interests, review degree requirements and curriculum, and discuss career paths and plans. Your academic advisor is there to help you navigate your academic career while keeping you on track to graduate on time.

TO SET YOU UP ON THIS PATH FOR SUCCESS, FOLLOW THESE STEPS:

- Learn the basics through the Pre-Orientation Online Module.
- Complete the academic interest survey.
- Attend your school's mandatory advising webinar.
- Utilize the Plan Ahead feature to prepare for class registration.

By establishing a solid foundation of courses in your first semester, you will be primed for success. The academic advising focus in the fall is preparing you for your first class registration.

While we know you may have specific questions about your academic plans, advisors are unable to discuss these broader goals until after you attend your school's advising webinar. Additionally, students will attend a First-Year Experience course in the spring. These First-Year Experience courses in conjunction with ongoing conversations with your advisor are the opportune time for you to address your plans and specific questions as your college journey begins.



CLASS REGISTRATION

■ How Class Registration Works

- As you prepare for spring registration, we encourage you to update your contact information, including your cell phone number and current address. You can do this by logging in to GWeb and navigate to the "prepare for registration" link under the Records and Registration menu.
- Prior to the date and time of your registration, you are encouraged to login to GWeb to ensure you can login successfully.
- On your spring registration date and start time login to GWeb.
- Once you are logged in, click on the Registration Menu. More details, including screenshots and instructions about the registration process is available in Section 1 of the Pre-Orientation Online Module.

- #OnlyatGW A phrase used by GW students, faculty and staff to describe events that one can only experience at GW, such as attending an oncampus event with Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor.
- Buff & Blue GW's official school colors.
- CC | Community Coordinator A professional staff member who lives in your residence hall. CCs are a resource for students living in the halls.
- CLRE Short for Campus Living & Residential Education. This is the team that manages the residence halls and helps students create community there.
- Gelbucks This is what you get when you combine Gelman Library with Starbucks. Why? The Starbucks is located on the ground floor of Gelman Library.
- GWorld | GWorld Card Your official student ID. It is used to tap into residence halls, swipe into the dining halls, and pay for laundry, printing and other
- GARMY George's Army, a.k.a. the student section at our sporting events (mainly basketball).
- HelWell Home base for campus recreation and fitness is the Lerner Health and Wellness Center, known colloquially as HelWell.
- Hilltern A student with an internship on Capitol Hill.
- Kogan Kogan Plaza is often shortened to just Kogan, as in "meet me in Kogan." It's the area outside of the Gelman Library, and our center of Foggy Bottom campus.
- LA | Learning Assistant A learning assistant is an undergraduate student who works closely with the instructor of a course to run small group sessions in class and review sessions outside of class. They differ from teaching assistants in that they don't share grading responsibility.

- MSSC | Multicultural Student Services Center -Provides multicultural programming, community, cultural education, and a safe and supportive environment for underrepresented and historically underserved students.
- Raise High! GW's rally cry that unites and encourages all students, alumni, faculty and staff to strive for excellence
- SA | Student Association GW's student government
- Safe Ride Provides a free and safe ride to/ from Foggy Bottom campus residence halls and academic buildings during late-night hours for students who prefer not to walk alone.
- Square 80 Green space area located between G and H streets and 21st and 22nd streets respectively.
- TA | Teaching Assistant Graduate or undergraduate students who help professors with grading and teaching and hold their own office hours to help answer student questions.
- The Vern | MVC The Mount Vernon campus is located in D.C.'s Foxhall neighborhood. The Vern as it is affectionately known houses about a third of the first-year population.
- USC | University Student Center- The studentcentric building that houses student organization meeting space, the Student Health Center, GWorld Office, Student Services Hub, the MSSC, Division for Student Affairs, student rooms and dining options.
- UserID Your UserID starts with the letter G followed by an eight-digit number. It is the ID that you'll use to log into most GW resources.
- U-Yard | University Yard GW's grassy quad on the Foggy Bottom campus.
- Vern Express | Mount Vernon Express The shuttle that transports the GW community between the Mount Vernon and Foggy Bottom campuses.

Purpose

Campus Living & Residential Education (CLRE) supports all aspects of residential living, creating safe, supportive and inclusive communities where all residents can feel at home. On-campus living is a premier residential experience that sparks vibrant communities, cultivates lifelong connections, promotes self-discovery, develops global leaders and fosters an affinity for GW.

Services

<u>First-Year Housing Registration</u>: All first-year students are required to live on campus unless approved for an exemption. Housing at GW is based on a student's class year at GW, not on the academic credits that a student has.

<u>Transfer Student Housing Registration</u>: If you have graduated from high school and completed at least one college course since high school graduation you will register for housing as a transfer student.

<u>Move In and Out Logistics</u>: After you receive your room assignment, you will sign-up for a move-in time slot .

Gender-Inclusive Housing: Students who identify as different genders or have a gender identity different than the one they were born with may live together in one apartment or room.

24/7 Administrator On-Call: Staff are on duty 24/7 to address urgent student concerns and provide after-hours support for situations that cannot wait until the next business day.

Faculty-in-Residence: Faculty live in the residential halls to facilitate learning beyond the classroom and serve as role models.

<u>Living-Learning Communities</u>: Communities where students live together based on shared interest or academic program.

Residential Student Leadership: Join your hall council to help program events and provide your voice and input in residence hall governance.



You will engage with <u>Community Coordinators</u> who are professional staff members living in the residence halls. They are there to assist with issues related to living with a roommate, personal difficulties adjusting to college life, and building issues or concerns.



TO BUILD CONNECTIONS

We encourage you to attend the events hosted in your residence hall by your Community Coordinators. These programs will help you meet your hallmates, and they create opportunities to build connections.



Purpose

Dining meal plans are designed to fit your unique needs. With flexibility, convenience and affordability in mind, the aim of the on-campus dining experience is to provide students with access to food that is culturally diverse and allergen-friendly in state-of-the art dining spaces inside our residence halls and through our on- and off-campus dining partners. All first-year students living on campus participate in the unlimited meal plan, which allows students to transition to life away from home without the concern of budgeting for each meal.

Services

On-Campus Dining:

- Three all-you-care to eat dining spaces: in Thurston, Shenkman and West residence halls.
- District House and the University Student Center dining offers different stations where you order a "meal deal," i.e., entree, side and drink at one of the four stations located within.
- Hillel Cafe serves kosher food with seating for 150 people.

GWorld's Dining Partners: A set amount of dining dollars are included with your unlimited meal plan. Use your dining dollars like a debit card to "eat out" at one of more than 80 dining partners across campus and in D.C.

GW's "GET" mobile app: Add dining dollars to your GWorld card at any time during the semester.



Once per hour you can dine at any of the all-you-care-to-eat dining halls, District House and the University Student Center. You can first swipe in at Thurston for lunch and then one hour later also swipe into Shenkman if you realize you are still hungry and want dessert or a sandwich to-go on the way to your next class.

Purpose

GW Information Technology (GW IT) is the chief provider of technology infrastructure, services and applications. The division equips students, staff and faculty with the technology know-how and tools necessary to achieve academic excellence by providing advanced technology solutions.

Services

<u>Claim Your Identity</u>: Set up your password and two-step authentication for your GW email. You will need your GW email to complete class registration, housing and other requirements.

Email: GW uses Google mail and calendar for student email accounts.


Internet Access: On-campus wireless internet access is available using your UserID followed by @gwu.edu and password.

Purpose

The Student Health Center (SHC) is a multidisciplinary, integrated student healthcare service that provides confidential, student centered care in an accessible, safe, culturally sensitive and supportive environment. The health center promotes healthy lifestyle choices in support of the physical and emotional well-being of students to help them achieve academic success.

Services

Medical Services: Physicians, nurse practitioners and registered nurses provide primary and preventative medical care services and monitor and respond to public health issues on campus.

Counseling and Psychological Services: Counselors provide a safe, nonjudgmental and confidential environment for students to discuss concerns through a personalized stepped-care approach.

<u>Psychiatric Services</u>: Assessment, diagnostic and treatment recommendations are provided by staff psychiatrists with short-term treatment available or for ongoing treatment, referrals are offered.

AcademicLiveCare: Access to expanded telehealth services including additional counseling services, urgent medical care, therapy and psychiatry appointments at no cost to full-time GW students.

Student Health Insurance Plan: GW offers a comprehensive plan through Aetna Student Health.

Purpose

Student Rights & Responsibilities fosters equitable and restorative accountability to community standards. This is accomplished by promoting individual rights and communal responsibilities, supporting community members to identify and repair harm, and growing community capacity for conflict management.

Services

<u>Code of Academic Integrity:</u> The primary document that sets minimum standards for academic student conduct, the code defines the rights of students charged with an academic disciplinary violation, lists the procedures for resolving academic disciplinary matters and provides guidance for academic disciplinary sanctions.

<u>Code of Student Conduct</u>: The primary document governing non-academic student behavior, it defines prohibited conduct for students and student organizations and sets up a conduct system to address reported violations and preserve student rights.

Before you become a GW community member, you'll want to know what GW expects of you and what you can expect from GW.

- Your right to **speech and expression**
- Your right to be free from **prohibited discrimination**
- What is permitted and prohibited for everything from marijuana use to academic citations *know the codes*.

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Purpose

The Title IX Office supports the university's commitment to maintaining a positive climate for study and work by fairly and equitably responding to reports of sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic and dating violence, and stalking. If you have experience sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic and/or dating violence or stalking, there are people at GW and in the community who want to help you. You don't have to go through this by yourself.

Services

GW Title IX Policies: GW policies explicitly prohibit sexual harassment, sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence and stalking. They also explain the resolution process when a formal complaint is filed with the Title IX coordinator.

<u>Title IX Office's Prevention Training Calendar:</u> Prevention education training is offered including topics such as healthy relationships, bystander intervention, how to respond to disclosures and designated reporter responsibilities.

Mandatory Title IX Training: All new, first-time students are required to complete an online and in-person training.

How to Get Help: If you have been affected by sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic and/or dating violence, or stalking there are campus resources to help you.

Title IX Online Reporting Form: Report sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic and dating violence, and stalking even if you were not directly involved in an incident and even if you would prefer to remain anonymous.

Student Financial and Registration Services is a centralized hub located on the ground floor of the University Student Center that brings together the offices of Student Financial Assistance, Student Accounts and the Registrar into one space. Staff are cross-trained to assist you with your financial aid, registration and billing questions.

Services

Apply for Financial Aid: Don't forget to re-submit your FAFSA yearly. March 1 is the priority deadline for continuing students.

Discuss your Bill and Charges: Students receive an eBill invoice for each semester enrolled. Payments must be made by the first day of class each semester.

Register for Class: Use the Plan Ahead tool to help you create up to five draft schedules to reference when it is time to register.

Secure Transcripts: You may be asked to supply a copy of your academic record if you are applying for a loan, scholarship or grant.

Online Help: Use the online chatbot to help with general questions about deadlines, how to complete required tasks and general navigational guidance. The chatbot can be found on the **Student Financial Assistance**, **Student Accounts** and **Registrar** websites.

Purpose

The George Washington University Police Department (GWPD) provides residential hall security and patrol services to the Foggy Bottom and Mount Vernon campuses and coordinates safety and security for a variety of oncampus special events. In addition to those roles and responsibilities, GWPD provides crime prevention education to the GW community.

Services

Around-the-Clock Patrol Services: Officers take reports and engage with students while on patrol and engage with students during campus events.

Rape Aggression Defense (R.A.D.) Class: A basic physical defense course for women focuses on techniques in self-defense, highlights awareness, prevention, risk reduction and avoidance.

Coffee with the Chief: Students have the opportunity to interact with the chief and the department's officers in a non-law enforcement capacity.

EMERG (GW EMS): A student-run EMS group serves the Foggy Bottom campus.
