In addition, this communication tool provides timely and relevant information, dates, deadlines and reminders you are required to complete over the summer and upon arrival to GW.

Between Next Stop, GW! Newsletters, our student team will communicate directly with you via email to provide check-in opportunities and ensure you are staying upto-date with action items.

NEW STUDENT CHECKLIST & ACTION ITEMS BY MONTH SUMMER 2024: YOUR JOURNEY TO GW

Placing your deposit is the first step on your journey to GW. As you prepare for your first day of class on Aug. 22, these are your must-do action items to complete by month to help you have a smooth transition to college. Visit your **Admitted Student Portal** to help you complete these tasks.

MAY

→ BY MAY 15

Claim your GW Identity (i.e., UserID/GW email) You will need your UserID/GW email to search for a roommate, apply for housing, register for classes and much more. Your UserID starts with the letter G followed by an eight-digit number. After May 15, we will no longer email your personal email address. Check your GW email often (we suggest daily). Your GW email is the primary means by which GW offices and units will communicate with you while you are enrolled at GW.

Note: You will need your UserID and GW email to complete the following action items.

Register for New Student Orientation

You must register for New Student Orientation by June 15 so we can reserve your space and assign you a small group. Reminder: In-person orientation is Aug. 18-21.

Submit Mandatory Health Immunizations

The District of Columbia Immunization Law requires Review and Update Your Personal Information that all enrolled students under the age of 26 provide In GWeb choose "My Profile" under the personal proof of certain immunizations prior to registration. information menu. Here you can add or update your Deadline to submit immunizations via the Student preferred name (which will be your display name Health Center medical portal is June 15. across university systems, including class rosters), pronouns and gender identity, and contact information. To update your legal name or sex, please use the Registrar's Biographical Update form. Note: you can review and update your personal information on GWeb at any time while enrolled.

Review GW's Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP) Coverage

All undergraduate students, including international students, must have medical health insurance coverage while enrolled at GW. Students are automatically enrolled each academic year in the GW Student Health Insurance Plan provided by Aetna Student Health.

If you are still covered by a parent's or guardian's employer coverage and want to continue using their health insurance plan, you must waive out of the GW Student Health Insurance option each year you are enrolled.

Before you waive out of GW's Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP), we recommend that you familiarize yourself with how your insurance coverage works outside of your geographic area (e.g., copays, deductibles, *networks*). This is especially important for international students as health care insurance from other countries may not be compatible with the U.S. healthcare system. The waiver period is Aug. 1-Sept. 12.

MAY (CONTINUED)

→ THROUGHOUT MAY

Start Working on Part I of your **Pre-Orientation Module: Academic** Advising and Class Registration

This module must be completed by June 15 as you will need the information learned in this module during a mandatory first-year group advising webinar. **Note:** While this module will be available starting May 3, you are not able access the module until after you have created your GW email.

Register for a Co-Curricular Program (if applicable)

GW co-curricular programs are offered prior to orientation from Aug. 15-17 to provide interested firstyear students the opportunity to connect with peers around a shared identity, specialized topic or common area of interest. Program size varies. Some first-year students are automatically assigned to a co-curricular program based on academic or learning community affiliation.

→ STARTING MAY 15

Register with Disability Support Services (if applicable)

If you are a student with a documented disability and require academic adjustments or housing accommodations, you can register with **Disability** Support Services (DSS). Should your situation change, you may register with DSS at any point while enrolled at GW.

→ STARTING WEEK OF MAY 13

Register for First-Year On-Campus Housing

All first- and second-year students are required to live on campus with a few exceptions for local commuters, etc. Students will receive instructions directly from Campus Living & Residential Education. The registration and room assignment process takes about a month. The registration process starts the week of May 13. Students will receive their housing assignment mid-June.

☐ Find Your Time Slot to Register for Fall **Classes Online**

Information about class registration is outlined in Part 1 of the Pre-Orientation Online Module.

Your registration session is determined by the last digit of your UserID. You have two hours to register at any time during your assigned slot. Professional academic advisors will be available during your session to assist with class selection. Mark your session time in your calendar and make every effort to attend, as switching sessions is not possible. However, if a student has an unavoidable conflict with their assigned time, a general makeup session is scheduled for Friday, July 26, from 9 a.m.-12 p.m. EDT.

Note: There is an equal distribution of courses and class seating availability among all registration times. No one session has an advantage over others.

→ STARTING JUNE 1

Take Placement Exams

Language, math, economics and chemistry classes may require placement exams to determine your class level. Note: You must complete all required placement exams a minimum of one week before class registration begins to help your academic adviser determine which course best fits your level and schedule.

Language: Each foreign language department has a specific exam and/or policy regarding placement. Those with high AP/IB scores and native speakers may have special instructions for which level they should take. For details, visit the **Language Center** website.

→ STARTING WEEK OF MAY 20

Upload Your Photo to Create Your GWorld Card (your student ID)

Your **GWorld Card** is your official GW identification card. It grants you access to campus including all academic buildings, the library and your residence hall. You will also use your card to enter the dining halls to eat, unlock your residence hall door, and print your term papers at printing kiosks. An email will be sent to you from the GWorld Card Office with instructions on how to upload a photo by July 1.

Math and Economics: The ALEKS (Assessment and Learning in Knowledge Spaces) Math Placement Test is required for any students who intend to register for ECON 1001, ECON 1011, MATH 1051, MATH 1220, MATH 1231 or MATH 1252. Consult the Department of **Economics' ALEKS webpage** and the Department of Mathematics' ALEKS webpage for more information on how to take the test.

Chemistry: General Chemistry (CHEM 1111) requires completion of the ALEKS Chemistry Preparatory Course (CPC). This applies to all incoming students who intend on pursuing coursework in the following fields: applied sciences, biological sciences, chemical sciences, engineering (most majors), physical science (B.S. only), pre-health sciences (e.g., dentistry, medicine, veterinary medicine and nursing). For more information and to take the test, visit the Department of Chemistry's ALEKS website.

Review and Submit Your FERPA Waiver (if applicable)

GW abides by the federal government's FERPA policy (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974), which requires the university to protect the privacy of your student educational record. This means staff and faculty can only talk to you, and not your parent, guardian or other family member about your classes, grades, financial aid, etc. If at any time, you would like to give consent to allow a staff or faculty member to talk to a family member about your educational records, you will need to fill out a **FERPA**/ Student Consent Release Form. Note: this form can be completed at any time while enrolled at GW.

Deadline to Submit Mandatory Health Immunizations

The District of Columbia Immunization Law requires that all enrolled students under the age of 26 provide proof of certain immunizations prior to registration.

→ MID-TO-LATE JUNE

Review Your Student eBill (tuition invoice) and Grant an Authorized User Access to **Your Student Account**

To help with your financial planning, the Office of Student Accounts will email first-year students a preliminary eBill, i.e., invoice for tuition, housing and dining and fees (as applicable) in mid-to-late June. A follow-up eBill will be issued in July after class registration. You (the student) can grant another authorized user access to your Student Account who can make online payments on your behalf such as a parent, guardian or another family member. Add a new authorized user by logging into the eBill system and clicking authorized users on the right menu bar. Next enter the other individual's

Register for Transfer Student **On-Campus Housing**

Housing registration for new transfer students will begin via a student's Campus Living eServices Portal in July.

Housing for incoming transfer students is based on a student's class year or anticipated graduation year. For transfer students, this accounts for the academic credits that a student has accrued prior to enrollment at GW.

☐ Waiver Period Open for GW's <u>Student Health</u> Insurance Plan

Mandatory Eligibility: All undergraduate, graduate, law, medical and doctoral students who are matriculated in a degree-granting, on-campus program (this includes students on the Foggy Bottom, Mount Vernon, VSTC and Corcoran campuses), and all international students on a J1 or F1 Visa are required to have health insurance while they study at GW. These students will be automatically charged and enrolled in the GW Student Health Insurance Plan (GW SHIP) every year. Students who choose to use their own health insurance or are covered by their parent's or guardian's health coverage must meet the **required waiver criteria** in order to opt out of GW SHIP.

Complete Part III of the Pre-Orientation Online Module: Arriving at GW

HEALTH – The only school of public health in Washington, D.C., Milken Institute SPH spearheads initiatives and programs that fight obesity, improve community health policy and assess the quality of care provided nationally and around the world.

By establishing a solid foundation of courses in your first semester, you will be primed for success. The academic advising focus over the summer is preparing you for your first class registration.

While we know you may have specific questions about your academic plans, advisers are unable to discuss these broader goals until after you attend your school's advising webinar. Additionally, students will attend a First-Year Experience course in the fall. These First-Year Experience courses in conjunction with ongoing conversations with your adviser are the opportune time for you to address your plans and specific questions as your college journey begins.

How Class Registration Works

- As you prepare for fall registration, we encourage you to update your contact information, including your cell phone number and current address. You can do this by logging in to GWeb and navigate to "Register for Classes".
- Prior to the date and time of your registration, you are encouraged to login to GWeb to ensure you can login successfully.
- On your fall registration date and start time login to GWeb. Even though you have a two-hour window, login at the start of the time frame.
- Once you are logged in, click on the Registration Menu. More details, including screenshots and instructions about the registration process is available in Part 1 of the Pre-Orientation Online Module.

Purpose

Campus Living & Residential Education (CLRE) supports all aspects of residential living, creating safe, supportive and inclusive communities where all residents can feel at home. On-campus living is a premier residential experience that sparks vibrant communities, cultivates lifelong connections, promotes self-discovery, develops global leaders and fosters an affinity for GW.

Services

First-Year Housing Registration: All first-year students are required to live on campus unless approved for an exemption. Housing at GW is based on a student's class year at GW, not on the academic credits that a student has.

Transfer Student Housing Registration: If you have graduated from high school and completed at least one college course since high school graduation you will register for housing as a transfer student.

<u>Move In and Out Logistics</u>: After you receive your room assignment, you will sign-up for a move-in time slot .

Gender-Inclusive Housing: Students who wish to live in a space with others who identify differently from them across the gender spectrum can opt into Gender-Inclusive Housing (GIH). Interested students will need a mutual roommate request and can create a roommate group with other individuals who wish to live in GIH.

24/7 Administrator On-Call: Staff are on duty 24/7 to address urgent student concerns and provide after-hours support for situations that cannot wait until the next business day.

Faculty-in-Residence: Faculty live in the residential halls to facilitate learning beyond the classroom and serve as role models.

Living-Learning Communities: Communities where students live together based on shared interest or academic program.

<u>Residential Student Leadership</u>: Join your hall council to help program events and provide your voice and input in residence hall governance.



You will engage with **Community Coordinators** who are professional staff members living in the residence halls. They are there to assist with issues related to living with a roommate, personal difficulties adjusting to college life, and building issues or concerns.



Medical Services: Physicians, nurse practitioners and registered nurses provide primary and preventive medical care services and monitor and respond to public health issues on campus.


Counseling and Psychological Services: Counselors provide a safe, nonjudgmental and confidential environment for students to discuss concerns through a personalized stepped-care approach.

Purpose

Conflict Education & Student Accountability promotes conflict management pathways and fosters equitable and restorative accountability to community standards. This is accomplished by promoting individual rights and communal responsibilities, supporting community members to identify and repair harm, and growing community capacity for conflict management.

Services

Code of Academic Integrity: The primary document that sets minimum standards for academic student conduct, the code defines the rights of students charged with an academic integrity violation, lists the procedures for resolving academic disciplinary matters and provides guidance for academic disciplinary sanctions.

<u>Code of Student Conduct</u>: The primary document governing non-academic student behavior, it defines prohibited conduct for students and student organizations and sets up a conduct system to address reported violations and preserve student rights.

- What is permitted and prohibited for everything from marijuana use to academic citations - know the codes.

Purpose

The Title IX Office supports the university's commitment to maintaining a positive climate for study and work by fairly and equitably responding to reports of sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic and dating violence, and stalking. If you have experience sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic and/or dating violence or stalking, there are people at GW and in the community who want to help you. You don't have to go through this by yourself.

Services

<u>GW Title IX Policies</u>: GW policies explicitly prohibit sexual harassment, sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence and stalking. They also explain the resolution process when a formal complaint is filed with the Title IX coordinator.

Title IX Office's Prevention Training Calendar: Prevention education training is offered including topics such as healthy relationships, bystander intervention, how to respond to disclosures and designated reporter responsibilities.

Mandatory Title IX Training: All new, first-time students are required to complete an online and in-person training.

How to Get Help: If you have been affected by sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic and/or dating violence, or stalking there are campus resources to help you.

Title IX Online Reporting Form: Report sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic and dating violence, and stalking even if you were not directly involved in an incident and even if you would prefer to remain anonymous.

Purpose

Services

Purpose

Student Financial and Registration Services is a centralized hub located on the ground floor of the University Student Center that brings together the offices of Student Financial Assistance, Student Accounts and the Registrar into one space. Staff are cross-trained to assist you with your financial aid, registration and billing questions.

Services

Apply for Financial Aid: Don't forget to re-submit your FAFSA yearly. March 1 is the priority deadline for continuing students.

Discuss your Bill and Charges: Students receive an eBill invoice for each semester enrolled. Payments must be made by the first day of class each semester.

<u>Register for Classes</u>: Use the Plan Ahead tool to help you create up to five draft schedules to reference when it is time to register.


Secure Transcripts: You may be asked to supply a copy of your academic record if you are applying for a loan, scholarship or grant.

Purpose

The Center for Career Services supports students through all stages of their career development, from exploring career options, interests and skills to gaining internship experience, building a professional network and transitioning into their chosen field after graduation. Industry Newsletters: Sign up for online newsletters produced by the industry career coaches and stay informed of the latest events, resources, internships and jobs in your field of interest.

Affinity Communities: Resources to assist the career and personal development of diverse students.

Purpose

Student Employment is an option for students to work in an hourly wage part-time position. Positions include Federal Work-Study (FWS) positions with an on-campus department or approved off-campus organizations as well as Non-FWS positions with an on-campus department. Working in a student employment position during your college years can help you gain experiences and develop skills for your future career.

Services

The **Student Employment** and the **Center for Career Services Career Learning** and Experience teams can help students through applying, interviewing and getting hired into a position.



Each year approximately 4,200 student employees work in 200 departments in FWS and non-FWS positions

APPLY EARLY, APPLY A LOT

Apply to positions early, apply to multiple positions and use the resources available to be successful in your position search. Most positions are filled in the first month of the fall semester. First-year students often wait and then have a challenging time finding a position.

Purpose

The George Washington Police Department (GWPD) provides patrol services to the Foggy Bottom and Mount Vernon campuses and coordinates safety and security for a variety of on-campus special events. In addition to those roles and responsibilities, GWPD provides crime prevention education to the GW community.

Services

Around-the-Clock Patrol Services: Officers take reports and engage with students while on patrol and engage with students during campus events.

Rape Aggression Defense (R.A.D.) Class: A basic physical defense course for women focuses on techniques in self-defense, highlights awareness, prevention, risk reduction and avoidance.

Coffee with the Chief: Students have the opportunity to interact with the chief and the department's officers in a non-law enforcement capacity.

Purpose

The Office of Emergency Management works with the GW community to lead GW in mitigating, preparing for, responding to and recovering from all hazards.

Services

EMeRG (GW EMS): A student-run EMS group that serves the Foggy Bottom and Mount Vernon campuses.

<u>GW Alert</u>: Email alerts are sent to all students to provide updates on emergency situations. To receive text alerts, add your mobile number to the portal.

Guardian App: An additional layer of security to GW Alert. This mobile app provides emergency notifications and allows you to message GW's emergency service

Campus Advisories: Provides incident-related and non incident-related updates to situations happening on and sometimes near campus.

Emergency Response Handbook: Actions to take if you find yourself in an emergency situation when on campus.

<u>GW Emergency Operations Plan</u>: The plan describes how the university responds to emergencies.

Purpose

The International Services Office (ISO) facilitates international educational exchange through its services and programs. It serves as the primary administrative, programming and advising office for the GW international community. The ISO is the first stop for the GW international community and will help eliminate administrative challenges when studying in the US.

Services

Advising: Expert advisors are here to answer students' questions related to their immigration status and to address any other concerns related to academic, personal or cultural adjustment as an international student. Advising services include one-on-one appointments with a student's dedicated advisor, weekly drop-in advising hours or support via email.

Events & Programming: The ISO is committed to enriching the student life experience and hosts a wide variety of events each academic year.
